While I could've gone the rest of my life without experiencing COVID, this season has provided some much-needed time to take inventory. I've spent hours and days sorting through things and making trips to Good Will. As I've gone through boxes, I've found myself lamenting the amount of useless stuff that I own that ultimately serves no purpose.



There's nothing inherently wrong with owning things, as long as we don't allow things to own us. I have a collection of walking sticks from different parts of the world. I am also a guitar enthusiast (in the process of getting rid of a few). I don't remember a time in my life, from childhood until now, where I lived in a house that didn't have a room filled with instruments. Music has always brought joy to my family.

The point is that it's okay to enjoy things, as long as we understand that things do not equal life. Some possessions are helpful. For example, I believe music and literature are beneficial for the soul. Thus, instruments and books add value to the human experience. One could make a case for just about anything. But when is it enough?

Sadly, regardless of how much one accumulates, eventually, it's all going to be sold at an estate sale. Have you ever been to an estate sale? It is the final landing spot for a person's belongings before they're tagged and sold to the public or auctioned off at bargain prices.

Estate sales typically happen after a divorce or a death. Walking through rooms once filled with life and rummaging through stuff that represents something that no longer exists can be a bit troubling. There is a sense of sorrow associated with it. At least, it feels that way to me.

I don't want to die a slave to the American Dream. Yet, we live in a culture that shoves it down our throat 24/7. It is a tragedy to think that the stuff we've spent our lives collecting ends up in a box in the garage or attic and ultimately sold for next to nothing. While this scenario might seem sad, maybe it's God's way of helping us see that our culture has fed us a lie, and we've taken the bait.

Numerous men and women, including many selfidentifying Christians, are content with a respectable career, a faithful spouse, a good family, a lovely home, a nice car, a few friends, a decent retirement, a quick death, and no hell. As it relates to estate sales, Jesus might point out that a person's life does not consist in the abundance of their possessions (Luke 12:15). In other words, no sane person on their deathbed has ever found comfort through the stuff stored away in their attic

During these times of uncertainty, confusion, fear, and conflict, the work of our Lord has continued. God is faithful! The KY District has planted several churches this year, even during a global pandemic when we haven't been allowed to meet.

Christian International Church launched at Southern Hills. Pastor Muhoza Rushingana waited several weeks before officially beginning to meet. Currently, a thriving congregation of more than 100 gather every week for worship. They are excited to have a place to call home.

Fuente de Amor launched at Valley. Pastor Omar Orellana is working hard to reach the Hispanic Community in the area. Revival Christian is meeting at Calvary Church in Lexington; Pastor Kaluta Lumenge is leading a growing congregation of more than 100 people.

Mount Sinai African Church continues to meet at Louisville First and has grown to over 120. Pastor Matthew Mabamba is a visionary leader.

Overflow Community Church is registered, and we are excited about the vision God has given Pastor Bob McCabe. We are currently working on two other potential church plants.

In the meantime, we are working with the District Superintendent to officially organize Life Bridge International, Comunidad de Gracia, and Al Estilo de la Cruz.

I am also preparing materials for the course of study this year. We celebrate the Hispanic and African pastors that are working toward ordination. To God be the glory!



Compassionate Ministries

We have all had to deal with COVID with our respective ministries. Looking back, I am thankful that our family obeyed the Lord and moved to Louisville during Christmas last year before the pandemic hit. As a family, we were able to get settled in for what would become a challenging yet rewarding journey. For me, 2020 consisted of two things: waiting and preparation.

Completed To Date

- (1) **501c3 Paperwork** It was finalized in February, two weeks before COVID shut down everything. Usually, the response time by IRS is six months. In October of 2020, the IRS sent the paperwork back and asked us to resubmit it digitally because most of their employees were working from home. We did this the very next day. We hope to hear back from them soon.
- (2) **Online Presence** We have created two Facebook pages: (1) Kentucky District Nazarene Compassionate Ministries; (2) Overflow Community Center. We also launched a website for OverflowCC. The website is averaging 60 views a week.
- (3) **Location** In September, Dr. Brian Powell spoke with Pastor David Roscoe. That conversation led to Calvary Church giving us the approval to start running programs at the church.
- (4) **Bank Account** Pastor Kevin Murphy is serving as treasurer. The donations received to date total \$3,800. We are using Two Mites for online giving.
- (5) Interacting with Churches I have met with leaders at Grace Community (Lou.), Louisville First, Laker Point Ministries, Farmdale, Creelsboro, Columbia, and Summersville. As churches get back to normal, I hope to meet with as many leaders as possible about getting involved.
- (6) Connecting to the Community I've been reaching out to people in preparation for opening the food pantry. I recently connected with Michael Simms, the family resource director for Bates and Tully Elementary Schools. Total students for the schools are over 1,000. He indicates that 15% lack nutrition, food, clothing, finances, etc. Michael has already notified 80 families about the pantry.

(7) **Grand Opening** – On Monday, January 4, we launched the Kingdom Pantry. We are open the first Monday of every month and also plan to help people in emergency situations. Some churches have done food drives. Pastor Rob Beckett is assisting with the food pantry until April. At that time, Dare to Care will partner with us in this vital ministry.

In Process

Fundraising – This will be ongoing. We will offer training to better equip our leaders and churches in raising funds for compassionate ministries.

Recruiting Volunteers – As of now, we have eight committed to helping in some way. These volunteers don't include the board of directors. We continue to work to recruit more help.

Compassionate Ministry Center – We are submitting the paperwork this week to register as a CMC. This will open the door for funds and more training and visibility.

Communication with District – We continue to connect regularly with pastors about how the non-profit can benefit local churches

Training – All training ceased due to COVID. In 2021, we hope to be able to reengage training events.

Our Vision: "Shaping A New Journey in The Heart of Louisville" (and beyond). We hope to accomplish this by embracing and partnering with the community to raise vibrant children, thriving families, and energetic neighborhoods through a Christ-centered approach that overflows in every aspect of our neighbor's lives.

<u>Our Mission</u>: Enable all local compassionate ministries on the Kentucky District to expand their involvement in their respective communities by having a network of resources to use to make a lasting difference.

My prayer is that Overflow Community Center will be a source of hope for the community. I desire to bring glory and honor to Jesus Christ in all we do. John 7:38 says, "He who believes in Me, as the Scripture has said, out of his heart will flow rivers of living water."




Let's keep missions at the forefront of our congregations. We are willing to meet with you any time (in person, via phone, or on Zoom) to help you stay on MISSION!
